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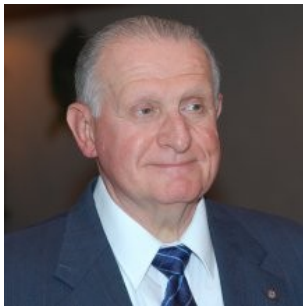

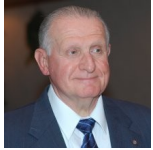
Ashutosh Dutta, the Region 1 Industrial Relations Liaison, hopes to organize similar Industry Days in the other three areas in Region 1.

What to Wear to Work

Have you ever wondered what is appropriate to wear to work? Stephanie Anastopoulos, from BAE Systems, gave a presentation on "What to Wear to Work" at Daniel Webster College in

December. Even though many companies have a casual business dress code, that doesn't mean that you can show up in torn jeans or a tee-shirt or flip flops.

Stephanie shared the following tips:

- 1- Remember you are judged by the way you dress (even if no one will admit it).
- 2- Look at what your boss wears and follow suit.
- 3- You don't have to spend a fortune on clothes, shop for nice clothes from the clearance racks.

- 4- Dress for the job you want - look at what people at the top wear and emulate them.
- 5- Keep a nice sweater or jacket handy (in your office) so that you can combat the cold or look nice for the unexpected customer visit.
- 6- Never wear brown with black!
- 7- Don't wear open-toed shoes - heels should not be larger than 2".
- 8- Keep jewelry (especially earrings) small and discrete - extra piercings are a definite no-no.
- 9- Black is the safest color for business attire. You can also wear grays and browns. Stay away from loud colors for the office.
- 10- Make sure your clothes fit well. Skirts should be at least knee-length. Pants and shirts should not be too tight.
- 11- Keep your hair and nails nicely trimmed. Wear light-colored nail polish so it doesn't look bad when it starts to chip.
- 12- Pay attention to the details - clean off the salt from your shoes and get new ones if they look very scruffy.
- 13- Jackets must be able to button and gaps in between shirt buttonholes do not look nice.
- 14- Iron your clothes - it does make a difference.
- 15- You can incorporate your personal style into your wardrobe - just do it professionally.
- 16- If you carry a handbag, make sure it doesn't look bulky. It should have sharp, crisp edges.
- 17- Don't wear anything showing too much skin (shorts, mid-riff shirts, low-cut blouses).
- 18- Always dress better for presentations - this is the time for you to demonstrate your skills to management and dressing professionally makes a good first impression.

Bottom line - if you look professional and polished, people will treat you with respect.

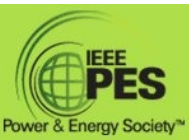

2009 Membership Renewal

For those who have not sent in your dues for 2009, they were due by December 31st. Of course, if you renew now, your membership will still be in good standing.

Senior Member Elevation

Remember, the qualifications are straightforward: “...a candidate shall be an engineer, scientist, educator, technical executive or originator in IEEE-designated fields. The candidate shall have been in professional practice for at least ten years and shall have shown significant performance over a period of at least five of those years.”

Note: a Ph.D. is equivalent to five years of practice, or an M.S. to four years, or a B.S. to three years.

If you meet the above requirements, we can support you in seeking Senior Membership. The process is simple:

- Fill out the [application form](#).
- Three references from Senior or Fellow grade members are required.
- If you are nominated by a Section, Society or Affinity Group, only two references are required.
- It is understood that it may be difficult for some candidates to find references. However, we can help you. Provide us with a recent CV

or resume and your application. We can then write a nomination letter from the Section.

- We have gathered a list of Senior and Fellow members who are willing, based on your documents, and possibly emails and phone calls, to provide you a reference.
