

Computer Society May 28 Meeting Report

Bob Gezelter, a Computer Society
Distinguished Visitor Program speaker
joined the CS Chapter for an informal discussion of security challenges
facing both the individual and business users. A number of key considerations surfaced, including the
legal exposure that businesses
have if they do not implement established security practices, and the

types of risks that personal users face from various forms of attack.

Besides the 'obvious' (virus protection, firewall, spyware protection),

it is important to avoid 'obvious' passwords and PINs, and also using the same password on important and non-important sites. The 'obvious' problem reflects attacks where obvious passwords are used while changing the user-name-account-number to break in; and for some sites, the passwords are stored in the clear and can then be used to break into your more critical accounts.
