The Professional Seminar Series is a series of very focused, highly technical programs on specific topics that are at the forefront of technology today. These sessions will typically be 2-3 hour sessions in the evenings. The Professional Seminar Series is a great way to increase technical knowledge, gain Professional Development Hour credits, and interact with technical leaders in the area.

We are continuing the development of active student chapter activities that was begun by Andy Dozier. Already the Student Chapters have conducted an IEEE Student Employer's reception targeted at linking graduating students and potential employers and a "Fastest Geek" Computer building competition. Upcoming events for students include a Student Professional Awareness Conference and the Southeast Concompetitions.

The Executive Committee is reaching out and establishing links with other related professional organizations in the area to help boost membership and awareness of IEEE activities.
