1. January 2006

Hyperbole aside, IEEE Sections Congress 2005, held 14-17 October 2005 in Tampa, Fla., brought together hundreds of volunteers from all over the world to sharpen leadership skills, enhance knowledge of the IEEE, and network with other volunteers.

[Let's Not Overlook Standards](#)

Engineers designing products know that they must comply with certain formal standards if the fruits of their labor are to be widely used, but few U.S. engineering students know much about them. The IEEE hopes to change that, thanks to educational materials about standards it put up on the Web this month. Its aim is to impart information about standards to university students, faculty members, and just about anyone else who might be interested.

[U.S. Engineers Week Zeroes In on Youngsters](#)

From linking engineers with educators to a design competition for kids to a family festival with an engineering theme, U.S. Engineers Week 2006, which takes place from 19 to 25 February, has a lot to offer. EWeek activities are meant to increase the public's awareness of the key role engineers play in society and to help build the technical literacy of young people. At the same time, the activities are likely to instill some pride among the working engineers who volunteer to participate.

ENIAC was the only computer around in 1946. The first general-purpose electronic digital computer, ENIAC was the size of a large living room and ran on vacuum tubes-lots of them. Not many people back then could have foreseen that some 60 years later, people would be walking around with computers as small as a briefcase and weighing less than a couple of kilograms.

6. **January 2006 - Featured Conferences**

[The Sky's the Venue \(Almost\) For Aerospace Conference](#)

Space started small, says the Big Bang theory. So did the IEEE Aerospace Conference, which will take place once again at Big Sky, Montana, from 4 to 11 March. When the conference started 27 years ago, "it drew about 20 or 30 papers and a similar number of attendees," says Ed Bryan, an IEEE member and one of the technical program's cochairs. The 2005 edition had 482 papers, and this year there will be even more. Besides seven plenary sessions, this year's conference will include 14 tracks, covering such diverse topics as space missions and operations, management, communications and navigation, space and air vehicles, software and computing, optics and electro-optics, avionics, and governmental involvement.
