Your technical society or local section doesn't have monthly meetings for the sake of having meetings but rather to help the member (you and me) to grow and develop. A current CV is also useful in developing a summary biography for introductions as a speaker or for submitting nominations. Speaking of nominations The volunteers that keep IEEE functioning are members like you. Get involved in IEEE is the way you will increase your return on investment.

As you update your CV you may consider having it peer reviewed. Why not ask one of your trusted colleagues in IEEE to take a look and give you their feedback?... or perhaps one of your mentors? IEEE is an excellent source of technical professionals that act as mentors as well as those needing to be mentored. Check it out.

The bottom line or root concept ... If you don't know who you are it is very difficult to chart a course for the future and unless you communicate

Region 3 Recommendations for Sections Congress 2011 David Green [d.green@ieee.org] Region 3 Director-Elect

As many of you know, every three years, IEEE hosts a Sections Congress to bring together leaders of the Sections for training, networking, education, and to hear recommendations for action. The 2008 recommendations and the IEEE actions on them are reported in the online document at <u>http://www.ieee.org/documents/</u> sc2008_recommendations_final_report_4may 2011.pdf . The process for 2011 is described online (see "Recommendation Process" link on <u>http://www.ieee.org/sc2011</u>). Briefly, the process is

- Region Recommendation Development (4 recommendations due 15 May)
- MGA Processing of Recommendations
- Delivery to Section Congress Attendees (up to 40 recommendations due 1 Aug)
- Deliberation at Sections Congress
- Voting on Recommendations to determine top 20 recommendations for IEEE to work (22 Aug)

In Region 3, we followed the process of

- Process developed and approved by ExCom (Jan 24)
- Discussion on Region 3 OnLine
 Community

- Discussion at IEEE-USA Annual Meeting by Region 3 attendees
- Development, debate, and voting on recommendations (with some after meeting rewording) at Region 3 Committee Meeting (SoutheastCon 2011, Nashville)
- Advocates and editors who volunteered at the Region 3 Committee meeting made small improvements in wording as well as added some background and meta information in the online community
- Distribution of summary report and planned submission
- Approval of the submission by Region 3 ExCom
- Submission to MGA (10 May 2011).

A good number of Region leaders contributed their ideas and energy to the effort. The post committee efforts strived to maintain the words and intent from the meeting while complying with the requirements of the submission and the direction of the Region Committee. Thanks to all who participated – it has been a pleasure to work with you.

The recommendations are

⇒ Provide robust communications to and from the member. This mechanism shall enable the originator and other interested parties to track the handling of the member's request/suggestion.

Information broadcast system shall enable centralized recipient personalization of: methods, content, and frequency; and shall integrate all modes of correspondence throughout IEEE.

- ⇒ Establish a Comprehensive Strategy for K
 -12 Outreach and facilitate its execution by
 - Providing Financial support for sections

 - Providing examples of projects that leveraged other resources

About Sections Congress 2011 -

IEEE Sections Congress, held every three years since 1984, provides IEEE Section leadership with a priceless opportunity to impact the future of IEEE.

It is the ideal place to network and share knowledge; provides a means to increase leadership skills and a working knowledge of IEEE; is a venue for expressing opinions and concerns through recommendations for action, which will be used by the IEEE Board of Directors to guide IEEE into the future.

The goals of SC2011 are three-fold

- 1. to provide an opportunity for delegates to gain information and training skills;
- 2. to network and build relationships with other volunteers within IEEE;
- to serve as a forum for Section representatives and other local leaders, enabling them to voice on behalf of the collective membership – the ideas, issues, and recommendations which will impact the development and growth of IEEE throughout the world, reinforcing its vitality and relevance to those it serves.

In addition to the individual growth and networking fostered by Sections Congress, there are more far-reaching results. The caucuses will generate specific, practical recommendations for action. During the Closing Ceremony, the delegates will have the opportunity to assign a priority level to each of the recommendations through the balloting process.

The results will be announced as part of the Ceremony and will be delivered to the IEEE Board of Directors for implementation in strategic planning for the future of IEEE.

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IEEE Atlanta WIE Celebrates the s Completion of its First Outreach Project Anastasia R. Davis, Atlanta WIE

The recently formed IEEE Atlanta Section Women In Engineering (WIE) Affinity Group celebrated the completion of its first outreach More than four hundred middle project. (6th-8th school girls graders), at lvy Preparatory Academy in Norcross Ga attended a series of fun and interactive presentations from a panel of eight WIE members. The objective of this project was to introduce the girls to exciting career possibilities in science, engineering and mathematics technology, (STEM) fields.

The presentation topics included NASA's Mars Science Laboratory antenna and landing gear for the Curiosity rover, ultrasound technology, satellite antenna technology, computer science education, iPhone/Android application development, embedded systems design, cellphone contract negotiations and a highenergy gamma camera for use with a new spectroscopic imaging method.

WIE members presented during three onehour lunch periods. Each group of about 150 girls piled into the cafeteria where the Dean of Students Victoria Hudson introduced WIE. Volunteers then passed out a reusable tote bag to each girl. The bags were made with the school colors, branded with the IEEE WIE logo and filled with National Engineers Week giveaways, presenter bios and candy.

The Atlanta Section WIE Chair Anastasia R. Davis introduced IEEE and WIE to each group and explained that the WIE members were visiting to show the girls how exciting and awesome it is to be a *nerd!* The chair also emphasized to the girls that they needed to pay close attention to the speakers because at the end there would be trivia questions and prizes to be won for the correct answers. Two or three talks were presented during each lunch hour. The students were very attentive and almost mesmerized during some of the most exciting presentations. It was amazing

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see how they were taking it all in and how excited they were to see what career possibilities are available to them.

Even with a few hiccups and technical difficulties, the project proved a great success. During the seven months spent planning for the project, many friendships were formed among the Atlanta WIE members. Attendance at monthly meetings grew from four members in March 2010 when the group was formed to 14 when the project was completed.

After the event, the WIE group received a few thank-you emails from the school and from parents. One was from a parent who stated that her daughter was so excited about what she was listening to that she completely forgot to eat her lunch. Another was from the Dean of Students who asked how soon the group could return to give a repeat performance.

Atlanta WIE celebrated the completion of this project with a dinner at Einstein's in Atlanta and would like to extend many thanks to the IEEE Atlanta Section and the WIE Committee for assisting in funding the event giveaways.

Make Your Life Easier

The IEEE has a set of tools to make your life as a volunteer easier, vTools. vTools stands for "Volunteer Tools". vTools simplify the administrative tasks to run your section or other organizational unit via online tools, reduce time spent managing activities, and assist in member development.

vTools are sponsored by IEEE Membership and Geographic Activities (MGA). MGA serves the needs of IEEE members by supporting IEEE Sections, Chapters, and Branches and is responsible for IEEE membership, and member development.

vTools is an active project in various phases of development. While most of the vTools allow public access to view data, typically only IEEE volunteers can create and modify data available for public access.

One of advantages of vTools is integration into the IEEE enterprise. You guys are smart folks. You can roll your own tool with similar capabilities. vTools place your date in the IEEE enterprise. This assures that someone will be able to See vTools, next page

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find it when you move on to your next challenge. It also means that your units data is safe from changes in leadership, corporate affiliation, or other unpredictable changes in circumstance.

vTools Meetings is now the primary method of reporting your meeting activities.

The last release added the credit card payment option and improvements to the L31 functionality as well as other small bug fixes.

The L31 Reports allow any IEEE Member to VIEW all Meeting Reports and provide improved wording on List / Search options.

The Credit Card Payment functionality payment option accepts credit card payments for your meetings. Payments are directly deposited in Concentration Banking. Payment reports are available from vTools and Concentration Banking System. The payment function is NOT automatically enabled. Organizational units who want it enabled should email concentration-banking@ieee.org AND vtools@ieee.org.

vTools.WebI naBox is a wizard to assist volunteers in generating simple websites in an automated fashion with no dependence on webmaster availability. It provides:

- Home Page that can be customized with a welcome message, announcement, and a picture.
- An optional Calendar Page shows events entered using the vTools.Meetings tool by volunteers.
- An Officer Information Page shows officer information. Volunteers specify what information (s)he wants to show: name, position, e-mail, phone, etc. This information automatically pulls from central IEEE data.
- An Other Units Page information on chapters, affiliate groups, student branches, etc is automatically pulled from IEEE data. Information includes unit name and a website if known. A volunteer can add custom links to other units

<u>vTools.Meetings</u> – tool for managing section and chapter meetings. Officers can create meeting announcements with no dependence on webmaster availability and show them on your website. Members and the public may see and register for the upcoming meetings.

<u>vTools.WebInABox</u> – wizard to assist officers generate simple section websites in an automated fashion with no dependence on webmaster availability.

<u>vTools.Voting</u> – tool to allow members submit votes in their Section officer elections online (please note that this is different from the general IEEE elections).

<u>vTools.StudentBranchReporting</u> – tool for collecting and searching reports submitted by student branch volunteers such as annual plan and report of activities. Beta version is available.

FluidSurveys - a Survey tool available to MGA Board members and MGA Board Committees as well as Region and Section EXCOM officers. Tool can be used to quickly create online surveys using intuitive interface and distribite them via Email, Web link, etc. Collected results can be easily analyzed and graphical reports can be shared with others.

More vTools projects – we are planning to introduce more tools in the next few years. Among the tools we will have: Awards, Section Dashboard, Communicate, Prospective Members, Membership Development, Off-line join, Agendas, and more.

on this page, for example a link to a "sister" section in a different region.

- An optional Blog Page shows most recent posts from your blog.
- A Links Page has a number of IEEE links plus custom links specified by the volunteer.
- A File Repository Page to post files and protect them with IEEE web account login.

vTools.WebInABox supports sections, subsections, chapters, and affinity groups. vTools.WebInABox is not meant to compete with or replace complex content management systems. It aims toward sections, subsections, chapters, and affinity groups without a webmaster that need a very simple wizard to publish a site.

The vTools.WebInaBox look and feel is designed to be in compliance with IEEE guidelines for web presence. It is updated as new guidelines emerge.

vTools.WebInABox is installed on the IEEE server, no local installation is needed.

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vTools.Voting

vTools.Voting allows members to submit votes in their Section/Chapter/Affinity Group Officer Elections online. The vTools.Voting project is piloted by Membership and Geographic Activities as a part of the MGA vTools portfolio that provides sections with a set of volunteerdeveloped tools to assist them in managing their ongoing activities.

Among system features vTools.Voting offers voter authentication via IEEE web accounts;

Student Branch Reporting

Student Branch Reporting has been made very easy. Once you log in with your IEEE web account, create a new report please select "New Report" from the top navigation menu. You are presented with a form as shown in Figure 1 (see page 9). Six tabs later you have submitted your Student Branch Report for the year.

Submitted reports from all of the student branches can be viewed by selecting "Submitted Reports".

FluidSurveys

FluidSurveys is available to MGA Board members and MGA Board Committees as well as Region and Section EXCOM officers. The tool can quickly create online surveys using intuitive interface and distribute them via Email, Web link, etc. Collected results can be easily analyzed and graphical reports shared with others. Figure 2 shows the tool.
