Southeastcon 2010

The annual IEEE Region 3 Student and Technical conference, ***SoutheastCon 2010: Energizing Our Future***, will be held at the Charlotte-Concord, NC Embassy Suites and Convention Center from March 18 through 21. This conference attracts 400 - 500 students and 200 - 300 IEEE professionals each year. There is over 40,000 sq. feet of convention space and there will be ample room for all of the planned activities.

The conference activities include:

- A technical conference portion comprised of workshops, tutorial sessions, technical paper sessions, poster sessions, and technical exhibits. The topics include the broad discipline of Electrical and Computer Engineering.

- A student conference portion, which **attracts the brightest ECE students and university faculty from across the Southeast USA**. Specific activities include:
 - Robotic hardware and software competitions.
 - Professional development workshops on Friday and Saturday. Several companies and practicing engineers will talk about various technologies, business practices, and experiences as a young engineer.
 - A student career fair solely for undergraduate and graduate students.
- A K-12 outreach program including programs developed by the Boy Scouts of America and Girl Scouts of the USA.
- Region 3 executive meetings.

There are many opportunities for companies and organizations to participate, including:

- Conducting one-hour workshops on products and product lines.
- Conducting full or half-day tutorials on technologies, products or product lines.
- Participating in the student job fair.
- Participating as an exhibitor.
- Hosting a lunch or dinner.
- Hosting K-12 outreach activities.

Charlotte is the largest city between Atlanta and Washington, DC. It is the 20th largest in the US and one of the fastest growing. The Charlotte metropolitan area is home to the headquarters of Duke Energy, Wachovia Bank, Bank of America, Family Dollar, Goodrich Corporation, Lowe's Hardware, many NASCAR teams, and many other businesses. Participating organizations so far include Microsoft, AREVA, Shaw Group, Schweitzer Engineering Labs, UNC Charlotte Energy Production and Infrastructure Center (EPIC), Charlotte Research Institute, NCEES, Cypress, and IEEE Financial Advantage.
