From the Director's Desk

"So what is this IEEE thing that you belong to, part 2?"



Some of you may remember this was the theme of my Director's Column in the spring of 2008. That answer focused on the fact that the IEEE is a member driven organization. This time I'll answer to what purpose.

The Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers, Inc.

(IEEE) is incorporated under the New York State Not-for-Profit Corporation Law. We are incorporated as a 501(c)(3) organization, specifically to be a scientific and educational

organization.

Per the IEEE Constitution, its "purposes are: (a) scientific and educational, directed toward the advancement of the theory and practice of electrical, electronics, communications and computer engineering, as well as computer science, the allied branches of engineering and the related arts and sciences; ... and (b) professional, directed toward the advancement of the standing of the members of the professions it serves."

The IEEE Constitution further goes on to state that "the IEEE shall strive to enhance the quality of life for all people throughout the world through the constructive application of technology in its fields of competence. It shall endeavor to promote understanding of the influence of such technology on the public welfare."

The IEEE Mission Statement states that its "core purpose is to foster technological innovation and excellence for the benefit of humanity." Its vision is to "be essential to the global technical community and to technical professionals everywhere, and be universally recognized for the contributions of technology and of technical professionals in improving global conditions."

Those are pretty lofty words and goals. The IEEE achieves them through its members - remember, we are a member driven organization. So I ask each of you, to paraphrase John Kennedy, ask

not what the IEEE can do for you, but what can you do for the IEEE. I think when you answer that question, you will also be benefiting yourself, your employer, and your profession. The answer is to participate in any of the IEEE activities.

As a guide to IEEE activities, the IEEE is organized as six major Operating Units (OUs), two of which are Technical Activities (TA) and Member and Geographic Activities (MGA).

Worldwide, the IEEE has 319 sections. These sections are organized into ten Regions, and together fall under the auspices of the MGA OU. IEEE Technical Activities is organized in an orthogonal fashion to MGA. Specifically, while MGA groups members by geographic proximity, TA groups members by fields of interest, for example, computers, communications, power systems, reliability, etc. There are 39 societies within IEEE TA and they all span the globe. The intersection of MGA and TA occurs at the local level in an organization called a chapter. There are around 1,600 chapters worldwide.

Every member belongs to a section. Since you are reading this, I can assume that you belong to one of the 22 sections in Region 1. You may or may not belong to a chapter depending on whether or not you opted to join a society when you joined or renewed your IEEE membership. If you joined the society, you are automatically a

member of the local chapter. As a member, you can participate in any of the section's or chapter's activities, including chairing one of its many committees or running for office. If you are not a member, you are nevertheless welcome to attend any of the local meetings (there may be a price differential however). You can start by selecting any one of the many meetings being held this month, and showing up. You should find it professionally rewarding.

The IEEE also has affinity groups under the MGA umbrella. One of these is the GOLD Affinity Group, GOLD stands for "Graduates Of the Last Decade." If you received your first professional degree within the last ten years you are automatically a GOLD member. Recently the MGA GOLD volunteers organized a humanitarian workshop in the Boston Section, 115 people turned out for the event. The majority of them were members of the IEEE and working professionals. The workshop was a successful collaboration with Engineers Without Boarders (EWB-USA), and involved partners from the nonprofit UN Foundation, the MIT Public Service Center, and a start-up company, Linknet Zambia. About half of the sections in Region 1 have active GOLD affinity groups, and they are always looking for GOLD members to network with.

Another affinity group is the Woman in Engineering (WIE) Affinity Group. While you need to optionally select WIE when you join or renew, you do not need to be a woman to do so. If you have an interest in furthering the role of woman in our profession or perhaps have a daughter or niece interested in engineering, please check out the WIE program. We recently held a WIE career-day in Atlantic City, and expect to be holding one in September 2009 in the New York City area.
