From the Chair of the Computer Chapter

There was a lot of activity in the Computer Chapter during the past quarter with the visit of Professor Dr. Werner Dirlewanger, who is chair of Applied Informatics at the Department of Mathematics and Computer Science in the University of Kassel, Germany. Professor Dirlewanger presented the seminar:

COMPUTER PROCESSING SPEED FROM THE 1940s TO PRESENT DAY

Why computer processing speed lags so much behind the speed of electronic components.

In this presentation, Professor Dirlewanger spoke about how the speed of electronic components had increased in a fantastic way since the early computers of the 1940s. But did the computer processing speed increase in the same way? It did not! The reasons are (among others) in the changes of the DP system concepts, in changes in the understanding of what computer processing speed is and in the continuous growth of software complexity. In this seminar, the stages of this development and what was behind them were presented. Then the latest state was shown, followed by a forward look as far as possible.

The presentation was held at Griffith University, Gold Coast Campus, and was repeated at QUT a few weeks later for the Brisbane audience. It was a great success, with long and passionate discussions afterwards. The event was a great success, and we wish to thank Professor Dirlewanger for an inspiring presentation.

Another great success was the Workshop on Measurement of Information Processing, Systems Performance and Software Efficiency held by Prof. Dr. Werner Dirlewanger at the Griffith University Gold Coast Campus from the 27th to the 30th of August, 2001. The IEEE Computer Chapter, in conjunction with Griffith University, supported this workshop. The following modules were offered:

1. Measurement and Rating of IP Systems Performance – Fundamentals

Definition of the terms performance, component performance, measurement and methods, system performance (definition, terms, workload), present day system performance measurement methods (overview).

2. Measurement and Rating of IP Systems Performance - Introduction to the ISO-DIN method - Part I

Principles, the data model of the user entity, the workload parameter set. The ISO workload description method, the measurement procedure, the user emulator, analysis and verification of the measurement output data, calculation of the performance values, rating by use of the theoretical reference machine.

3. IP systems performance measurement and estimation of SW Efficiency-Introduction to the ISO-DIN method-Part II Measurement series, the ISO measurement procedure, the "urn method" measurement of SW-Efficiency, ISO type workloads.

4. Performance of an ISO type measurement




