Final Year Student Thesis Prize Competition

Final year Student theses from QUT, GU (Nathan), GU (Gold Coast) and UQ were submitted. The criteria for IEEE student prize for the best final year undergraduate thesis in all fields of Electrical Engineering and Information Technology were novelty, potential commercial value, technical merit, theoretical value, and thesis presentation. The IEEE Committee Queensland Section congratulates Jolon Faichney for his winning thesis titled "Mobile Handheld Video Conferencing".

The thesis investigated video coding techniques for suitability in a handheld computing environment using wireless communications.

Professional Activities of IEEE Queensland Section

Dr. Anwar Dawood the Professional Activities Chair has arranged for a series of workshops for IEEE current and potential members. The first

workshop was organised on Thursday 8 July 1999 at OUT Gardens Point Campus. Dr. Anwar Dawood and Dr. Ed Palmer worked cooperatively to arrange this event. They invited three consultants from Morgan and Banks to deliver this workshop. The three Morgan and Banks consultants (Mr Andrew Farrington, Mr Al Sheen, Ms Tanya Felton) provided very comprehensive and consistent presentation on current and future demand for Electrical Engineers and Information Technology specialists. The presentation was titled: Career Management in the Engineering and IT Markets The workshop was interactive type event and the presenters and participants had the opportunity to address the following key issues:

- Current overview of engineering and IT employment markets including industry projections of short term future direction.
- Overview of general current and future employment trends.
- Insights into successful methods for individuals to manage own career development.
- Developing an understanding of individual's own personal and professional career drivers.
- Interactive discussion regarding career related topics that are of interest to the audience.

From the Chair of the Computer Society:

1998 was a year full with activities organized for the members of the Computer Society. Some of the highlights were:

"EDUCATION MEETS INDUSTRY IN COMPUTING" This seems to be becoming an annual event. It is about how well (or not so well) our University graduates are prepared for the Industry that absorbs them.

On behalf of the IEEE Computer Society Chapter, Queensland Section, I would like to thank the Information Industries Branch for its participation and hosting the "Education meets Industry in Computing" forum, aimed at helping industry work more closely with the academic community.

Initially the discussion was limited to a selected panel from the Industry and local Universities. This was followed by inviting the audience for their comments. An informal discussion amongst all participants concluded the event.

The main discussion theme was

"Students trained a la carte: disaster or blessing?" Could you imagine your students being trained in the IT topics that Industry has requested to be taught at Universities via a "request a topic data base entry" (e.g. each topic requires one or more lectures, but no set courses are offered)

Needless to say that it was a very interesting at times controversial and fervent event. Here is a sample of issues that arose:

- "What a wonderful Idea where do we sign up?"
- "Is technical expertise relevant in today's increasingly management / service oriented business climate?"
- "As a nation, we are attempting to educate far too many young people to a degree level in far too many vocations and in far too many Universities for our size of population."
- "University IT courses should be structured as a Business!"
- "It is impossible for employers to play a strategic role in curriculum design. Many employers of 2004 do not exist now."
- "... Gartner indicates that there are only 7 people for every 10 jobs, yet the Universities continue to produce people who lack specific skills needed to find jobs"
- "All Computer Science degrees should include enough business components to allow students to understand the basic principles of issues like cash flow, organizational structure, marketing, etc."
- "If academics are so good, why aren't they in industry making a fortune?"
- "The major issue in IT education is the balance between the immediately useful and the fundamentals which provide for future adaptability."

Activities of the GUGC IEEE Student Branch

Griffith University Gold Coast may be a small campus with no complete Electrical Engineering degree on offer; however, this has done little to stifle the formation of a very active IEEE Student Branch. In late 1997 formation of the Branch began within the School of Information Technology with the few active IEEE members with degrees in EE on staff and as postgraduates. This was sufficient to "set the ball rolling" and on 27 August 1998 the GUGC IEEE Student Branch was officially recognised by the IEEE.

The official recognition of the GUGC IEEE Student Branch was the culmination of approximately 12 months of planning, petitioning and promotion. The concept was brought to the IEEE Queensland section, the School and its students using various means. The chief motivator in the formation of the Branch was Renate Sitte, whose continued support is greatly appreciated.

Since it's inception, the GUGC Student Branch has hosted several activities. These have included promotional social gatherings for students of the School of Information Technology, technical activities and combined social events in conjunction with the SoIT.

Three social gatherings aimed at undergraduate students of the school have involved formal addresses from various IEEE executive members including the QLD section secretary, as well as the Student Branch counsellor and Chair. In July of 1998 a similar event was aimed at Master's students. This event was co-sponsored by the School of Information Technology and the campus' Science and Engineering Society. All of these events have been very successful in attracting student interest in the IEEE. The most recent social gathering for undergraduates was held in March 1999. As a result of this event, over 30% of the students present signed up for IEEE membership on the day with several others submitting forms within the following fortnight.

In October 1998, the Student Branch co-hosted, with the IEEE Computer Society, its first technical activity: a workshop by the taxation office called "A Guide to Keeping Your Business Records". One of the chief concerns of the branch is to provide activities that are of

interest to its members locally, since most QLD section activities are currently held in Brisbane making it difficult for members on the Gold Coast to attend. This year we plan to hold two further technical activities in conjunction with the Computer Society.

Membership continues to grow steadily. As a service to new members, the branch mails out completed application forms. Generally, applications are collected over the course of a month and bulked mailed. The next mail out will contain at least 15 membership forms.

Another major aim for Branch is to strengthen our relationship with the School of Engineering. Although, a full EE degree is not offered on the Gold Coast, relevant transfer courses are. Thus, we could provide many useful activities for students in the earlier phases of their degrees.

Despite being new and small, the GUGC IEEE Student Branch has been very busy in the past 18 months. Our plan of activities for 1999 would appear to continue this trend. In keeping with the IEEE motto, we would be happy to collaborate with any other Student Branch in suitable activities. Further we extend an invitation to all IEEE members to attend any of our technical activities.
