STUDENT ETHICS COMPITITION

The St. Ambrose ethics team (Jon Dreasler, Ken Wheeler, Brandon Potter, Grant Lehmann) competed at the IEEE Region 4 ethics competition at Illinois State University this Saturday (Nov 10) and placed second. They had a great time and were very pleased with the results. All four students are now student members of IEEE and the Computer Society. The first place team was Marquette University.

The team's advisor (and section board member) Gary Monnard, attended the all-day student leadership conference for student IEEE chapter officers, which occurred simultaneously with the competition, and which he found very informative and enjoyable. The IEEE reimbursed all travel expenses.

The student team spent 3 hours preparing a 12- minute Power-Point Presentation on a case study provided at the beginning of the competition. They were required to analyze the case study using the IEEE code of ethics as the criterion for ethically appropriate behavior. Each team made its presentation, followed by 5 minutes of



questioning by the panel of judges. Since they still have their PowerPoint presentation, they would be willing to make a presentation to the Iowa-Illinois Section in the next few months. This might be a topic for our January meeting. Watch our website for an update!

Did you know that IEEE is more than just an engineering organization? IEEE is a professional organization for all sorts of degreed technical professionals. There are dozens of different societies that focus on a different area of technology. Most societies cost an additional \$10—\$35 and include a magazine subscription. Student

memberships are even less. If you are considering joining IEEE, you might choose to start out as an affiliate member and join a society for about \$100 annually.
