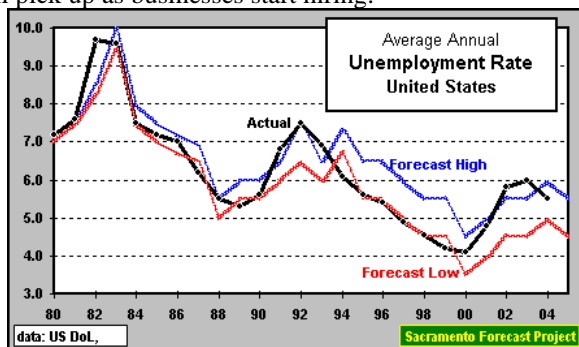

A recent report from IEEE-USA says that U.S. Technical Employment has fallen by 221,000 workers from 2000 to 2004.

The jobs hardest hit have been computer programmers and electrical engineers. "The drop in computer programmers and rise in managers reflects the trend toward offshoring of programming jobs and the resulting need for professionals to manage outsourced projects," IEEE-USA President Gerard A. Alphonse said. The drop in EEs, as well as employment in general, has been affected by the dot-com crash that lasted from 2000 till 2002. During that time the Nasdaq Composite lost 78% of its value as it fell from 5046.86 to 1114.11. However, business is turning around and the unemployment rate is falling (see graph below) and hopefully jobs for EEs will pick up as businesses start hiring.
