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General Information

Welcome to San Francisco

San Francisco, California, is a spectacular peninsula surrounded by water on three sides and grows from the inside out. This modern city has become one of America's favourites and is visually spectacular, with many world-famous steep hills offering incredible views of San Francisco Bay and the breathtaking Golden Gate Bridge, which opened in 1937 and immediately became the longest suspension bridge in the world.

The Pacific Ocean forms the westerly boundary of the peninsula, while San Francisco Bay lies directly to the east. In total there are three main districts – downtown (between the bay, Market Street and Van Ness Avenue), South of the Market District (SoMa) and the westerly side of the city, which is mainly residential and incorporates Pacific Heights, Richmond, the Golden Gate Park and the Marina area. For everything in the way of tourism, pay a visit to the highly regarded **San Francisco Visitors Information Center**, which is located within the Hallidie Plaza on the corner of Market Street and Powell Street.

San Francisco is regularly classed as one of the top tourist destinations in the world and it is easy to see why. With top attractions such as Alcatraz Island – the 'Rock in the Bay' which was once the most notorious prison in existence, housing some of America's most dangerous offenders; Pier 39 on Fisherman's Wharf – a lively bay area with numerous shops, arcades, seafood restaurants, cafés, fairground rides, ocean views and its own colony of sea lions; Lombard Street – probably the world's most bendy street; and of course the famous San Francisco cable cars, which provide cheap and easy access to the whole city and its many steep hills.

There are also some great museums here, boasting a wealth of information about the city itself and exhibiting many interesting collections, such as the Museum of the City of San Francisco – established in 1991 and telling the interesting story of the the city's history, and the unusual Fortune Cookie Museum – a small fortune cookie factory producing over 20,000 fortune cookies a day in the city, where fortune cookies were actually invented. San Francisco can also boast numerous excellent art galleries, shopping districts and restaurants. In fact, when it comes to food there are almost 4,500 different restaurants, cafés and bars in in this part of California, which has become nothing short of the nation's trendsetter when it comes to food.

Another major San Francisco tourist attraction is the Hakone Japanese Tea Garden, situated in the vast Golden Gate Park. These traditional Japanese gardens provide the most tranquil place in the whole of the city and cover around two hectares / five acres. With koi carp ponds, pagodas, drum bridges and a Japanese Tea Room, these exquisite landscaped gardens are well worth a visit.

The local climate is generally mild and very sunny, in spite of the famous morning fog. The city is without question a lively and friendly Californian destination, with some highly developed areas, including tall skyscrapers, and contrasting, more traditional districts, such as Chinatown – home to one of the largest Chinese communities outside of Asia. The cosmopolitan city of San Francisco is diverse, open minded, exciting and most of all, enjoyable.

San Francisco Attractions

Tours can can be booked and organized through the tour desk located at the Lobby level of the Hilton hotel.

• Fisherman's Wharf

The ultimate tourist's dream – a myriad of souvenir shops, restaurants, and sea lions all in one centralized area. Visit Pier 39, the Cannery and Ghirardelli Square for all your shopping indulgences. Street entertainers will amuse you amidst the spectacular backdrop of San Francisco Bay.

• Cable Cars

Ride the legendary cable cars for breathtaking views and a first-hand experience of the streets of San Francisco. Purchase one-way tickets at the cable car terminals, police/information booths or on board the car itself. For unlimited all-day access invest in an \$14 Muni pass good for rides on the cable car lines, buses and streetcars.

• Alcatraz Island

Over 14 million people have visited Alcatraz for a glimpse of life in the prison known as "the Rock." Take a ten-minute boat ride to the infamous maximum-security prison where criminals such Al Capone, "Machine Gun" Kelly, and Robert "The Birdman" Stroud were kept isolated from the public.

• Golden Gate Bridge

A San Francisco icon and a sightseer's must see. The Golden Gate Bridge is one of the world's most beautiful and most photographed bridges. There's only one way to experience it – put on some comfortable shoes and take the hour roundtrip walk across or rent a bike to and also explore the high-society neiborhoods of Sausalito/Tiburon!

• Golden Gate Park

Golden Gate Park is the largest urban park in San Francisco. At 1017 acres, it is in the shape of a long rectangle, similar in shape but 174 acres larger than New York's Central Park. A narrow strip, known as The Panhandle, extends from the eastern end of the park. The park was planned in the 1860s and built in the 1870s on land that was

thought to be uninhabitable. The park contains several San Francisco landmarks, including the de Young Museum and the Conservatory of Flowers

Chinatown

Enter the world of the Far East while staying in San Francisco. Just steps away from Union Square you can meander through a bustling neighborhood filled with Chinese temples, exotic herb shops, Asian restaurants, fish markets, bookstores, produce markets, and bakeries. Buy fortune cookies or have your palm read along the way!

• San Francisco Museum of Modern Art

SFMOMA opened in 1935 as the first museum on the West Coast devoted solely to 20th century art. Open daily (except Wednesdays) from 11:00 am to 6:00 pm. Shop for posters, books, and apparel in the Museum Store and support the exhibitions and programs the museum offers.

• Union Square

In the epicenter of downtown San Francisco you will find a 2.6 acre manicured park serving as a haven for both people-watching and world class shopping. Enjoy the finest names in fashion, dining, and theatre, or enjoy a cup of coffee and simply watch the world go by.

• Ferry Building

Not only is the Ferry Building the gateway to San Francisco's Financial District, it is also a jumping off point to many local destinations -- many within walking distance, others accessed by the famous cable cars that run through the streets of San Francisco. With the recent renovation of the Ferry Building and the Ferry Building Marketplace, there's a lot to do at this dynamic locale. The new Marketplace has shopping, dining, a yearround farmer's market (Sat., Sun., Tues. and Thurs.), plus free tours of the Ferry Building on Saturdays, Sundays and Tuesdays at noon.

• Pier 39

Among the City's most visited attractions, Pier 39's entertainment options include V --The Ultimate Variety Show; Turbo Ride; Blue & Gold Fleet Bay cruises; and Alcatraz Island Tours; Riptide Arcade and Studio 39. As many as 800 sea lions now reside on the pier's "K" dock.

Weather

Because of its sharp topography and maritime influences, San Francisco exhibits a multitude of distinct microclimates. The high hills in the geographic center of the city are responsible for a 20% variance in annual rainfall between different parts of the city. They also protect neighborhoods directly to their east from the foggy and sometimes very cold and windy conditions experienced in the Sunset District; for those who live on the eastern side of the city, San Francisco is sunnier, with an average of 260 clear days, and only 105 cloudy days per year.

Temperatures exceed 75 °F (24 °C) on average only 28 days a year. The dry period of May to October is mild to warm, with average high temperatures of 64–71 °F (18–22 °C) and lows of 51–56 °F (11–13 °C). The rainy period of November to April is slightly cooler with high temperatures of 58–64 °F (14–18 °C) and lows of 46–51 °F (8–11 °C). On average, there are 67 rainy days a year, and annual precipitation averages 20.4 inches (518.16 mm).

Transportation (San Francisco Airport – SFO)

• Taxis

Taxis depart from the designated taxi zones located at the roadway center islands, on the Arrivals/Baggage Claim Level of all terminals. Uniformed taxi coordinators are stationed at the taxi zones from 7:00 a.m. to 1:00 a.m. to assist passengers with questions or concerns. The price from SFO to the Hilton Hotel is approximately \$45.00

• Shuttle Services

Shared-ride vans provide service between SFO and passenger-specified locations. Depending on the number of passengers, shared-ride vans may make multiple stops. Van service is available on a walk-up basis. Shared-ride vans pick up passengers on the Departures/Ticketing Level from the roadway center island at all terminals. The price from SFO to the Hilton Hotel is approximately \$19.00


BART Transit Line

BART is the fast, easy, inexpensive way to get to San Francisco and around the Bay Area. Trains arrive at the SFO International Terminal every 15 minutes and it's just 30 minutes to downtown San Francisco. A one-way ticket from SFO to downtown is \$8.10.

The SFO BART Station is located on the Departures/Ticketing Level of the International Terminal (Boarding Area G side). BART is easily accessed from any terminal by riding SFO's AirTrain to the Garage G/BART Station stop.

Useful Information

• Electricity and Electrical Sockets

Electrical plugs in the United States have two flat pins. If you are traveling from outside the country you will probably need an adaptor to connect your electronics. The standard voltage in the United States is 110 V (60 Hz).

• Time Difference

The official time in San Francisco is 8 hours behind Greenwich (in summer GMT-7). In comparison, San Francisco is 3 hours behind New York, 8 behind London and 9 hours ahead of Hong Kong.

Business Hours

The business hours for stores in San Francisco are generally from Monday to Saturday and from 9:30 or 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 or 7:00 p.m. Some stores in tourist areas like Fisherman's Wharf, Chinatown and North Beach stay open until midnight.

• Currency in the United States

The official currency of the United States is the U.S. dollar (\$, USD, US\$).

• Credit Cards

Most major credit and debit cards are accepted throughout the USA, including American Express, Diners Club, MasterCard and Visa. Visitors are advised to carry at least one major credit card, as it is common to request prepayment or a credit card imprint for hotel rooms and car hire, even when final payment is not by credit card.

• Tipping

Unlike many countries, service is usually not included in the bill with the exception of large parties (typically six or more people). If you're with a large party, be sure to check your bill just in case. 15%-20% is often automatically charged for a large party (six or more). If the tip is included, the breakdown of the bill will read "gratuity", which means that a tip is already included.

• Smoking

Smoking throughout California is banned from all public indoor spaces. This includes bars, restaurants and offices. In such places you are more likely to find a magical talking unicorn than an ashtray. It is also banned outside from within 20 feet of an entrance to a business.


